





- American Colonial Revolution against Britain

 - George Washington's Schooners




Continental Navy


- October 13, 1775, 2nd Continental Congress Uresolves to:
 - If out two vessels for "intercepting such transports as may be laden with warlike stores and other supplies for our enemies, and for such other purposes as the Congress shall direct."
- > 13 vessels, \$880,000 (\$264 m) total
 - Most all are lost in battle or calamity
- French naval allies victory off Virginia Capes
 - British Surrender at Yorktown in 1781


